Moving Towards Acceptance

As we draw to the end of 2020 it is fair to say that this is going to be a year that we are unlikely to forget, in fact I wouldn't be surprised if in years to come, 2020 will be on the national curriculum in our schools' history books.

As we head towards the start of 2021 I am sure that we are all hoping that the New Year will look very different. There has been a lot of talk about a 'new normal' as we enter another year, but the reality is that we don't really know what that will look like.

I have written in previous letters about the importance of acceptance when we face difficult times and as we approach Christmas I think this is going to be more important than ever before. Whilst leaders around the world are talking about trying to have stricter 'lock-down' rules now so that Christmas can be as normal as possible, we also need to accept that Christmas this year may be like no other we have had before. In order to make it the best that we can, we first need to accept that it is how it is and then to focus on what we can do rather than dwelling on what we won't be able to do – I know this may not be easy, as the things that we may not be able to do are the important things that we love to do, especially around family and community, but it has to be a better alternative to dwelling.

I don't have answers to all my questions, there are things I simply don't understand, there are things I have prayed for that I have not seen answers to, but I still believe that God is who He says He is and who I have known Him to be in the past – He is still Emmanuel – God with us.

Coronavirus

Just as we thought we might be getting back to some kind of 'normal', the pandemic is rushing through again. It is true, some people think it would be best to allow the virus to run its course and everyone take responsibility for their own health / safety etc. However, this is easy to say, but it has been proved that it can be passed on to others by someone who does not even know that they have the virus. So even those who are most conscientious and careful to sanitize, wear a mask etc., are just as liable to contract the virus. It is impossible to know what advice and direction to take.

Since the beginning of this year, everyone the world over has suffered loss of some kind. The loss of loved ones so unexpectedly, and not being able to say "goodbye" in the traditional way, has been devastating for so many people. The loss of livelihoods and certain freedoms is something we are learning to live with.

Young people particularly are finding it hard - not able to secure employment after leaving school or university.

School children missing out on their education, and of course interaction with their friends.

At the time of writing, the tier system has just been introduced and it seems possible that more stringent rules may come into force, and possibly another complete 'lockdown'. Let's hope not. At the moment it seems more confusing than ever for a lot of people.

It's certainly true that this year has been a year like no other we have known. *Ed.*

The following is the latest advice given out by Mid Sussex District Council:

COVID 19 – Community Safety advice to residents

Whilst most people are supporting one another, there is still a small minority who will look to criminally exploit situations like this. If you are self-isolating and require assistance with shopping, cleaning or care services, please use trusted sources – friends, family members or neighbours or a trusted local charity. If you have no support network and are not sure who can help, please contact the West Sussex Community Support Helpline on 03302 227980. It is okay to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. If the person is genuine, they will understand.

Always be aware of people and companies who may try to sell items at an increased price in order to profit from Coronavirus.

Doorstep offers

Don't put up any signs on the front of your property which indicates you are vulnerable or in self isolation. Always ask for ID and be suspicious of requests for money up front. If someone attempts to pressure you into accepting a service, they are unlikely to be genuine.

Don't provide your banking details to anyone at the door.

Phishing emails

There have been some scammers that are offering virus testing kids or treatments, vaccines or cures for Coronavirus. Testing is only offered by the NHS and there is currently no vaccine for Coronavirus. Please follow public health advice on what to do if you have symptoms or call NHS 111.

Telephone scammers

With more people self-isolating or working at home, it is possible that you might receive more scam phone calls than usual.

Don't reveal personal details or provide financial information (such as your bank account details or your PIN) over the phone, even if the caller claims to be from your bank. Hang up. If you feel harassed or intimidated, or if the caller talks over you without giving you a chance to speak, end the call. It may feel rude to hang up on someone, but you have the right not to be pressurised into anything. Don't be rushed. Scammers will try to rush you into providing your personal details. They may say they have time-limited offer or claim your bank account is at risk if you don't give them the information they need right away.

Online shopping fraud

Only purchase goods from legitimate retailers. If you're purchasing goods and services from a company you don't know, carry out some research first. Look up reviews of the company and ask trusted friends and family members if they know of the company. If in doubt, don't use them.

Be wary of unsolicited emails and texts offering questionably good deals - if it looks too good to be true, it probably is! Never respond to messages that ask for your personal or financial details.

Avoid paying for goods and services by bank transfer as that offers you little protection if you become a victim of fraud. Instead, use a credit card or payment service such as PayPal if possible.

Where do you come from?

I and my siblings apparently had a slightly 'different' accent for a while when growing up. Influenced by being the only English 'kids' among American missionary children on a mission station in Tanzania for a while, then home and school in Kenya among contemporaries with 'Kenyan' accents (whatever that was) my speech and that of my sisters and brothers must have reflected something of those environments. So new friends back in England would sometimes ask "where do you come from?" Invariably asked by friendly, interested people I did not usually mind being asked. I was proud of my heritage as the child and grandchild of missionaries.

Born in Kenya, I was the son of a missionary surgeon. He himself had been born in Congo, the son of pioneer missionaries to that huge country in the early 20th Century. My wife, Jen, has an even longer heritage as a 'Missionary Kid' - born in South Sudan, she is the daughter of missionaries there, and grand, and great-grand daughter to pioneer missionaries to China and East Africa. She, too, is proud of that heritage. However, the question may not always be innocent. "Where do you come from" may be a front for the hidden message "you don't belong here", and have the intended result of making the person being asked uncomfortable. The recent 'Black Lives Matter' movement has highlighted again how insulting that question may be when aimed at a person who does not share the same colour skin, similar style clothes, accent or some other characteristic which may differ from the prevailing majority.

As Missionaries ourselves in Uganda, and white skinned people in a very small minority, Jen and I have often been asked "where do you come from?" Recently, stopped by a police road check in Uganda, the officer in charge asked us, after the routine questions had been completed, whether we were missionaries. We said "yes – why do you ask?" We were really encouraged by his answer, "Well", he said, "you are white, and you are humble"! Knowing ourselves well enough to be painfully conscious that we are often proud, we thanked God for His grace that enabled us to respond humbly on that occasion. We have experienced racism directed at us as minority whites in a black country when it was intended to hurt, make us feel uncomfortable, foolish or unwanted – it is painful, and you need to be very secure to be able to avoid being hurt and wounded.

Yes, we're proud of our Missionary heritage, and we're not ashamed of that particular pride! To those who deride, mock, and bitterly criticise Christian missionaries we would answer that the heart of the Christian message is that of love. St Paul wrote, "If you love, you fulfil the whole (of God's) law" (Romans 13:8), and St John wrote, "God loved the world so much that He gave His only Son, so that whoever believes in Him will not die, but have eternal life" (John 3:16). Jesus Himself taught "If you hold to my teaching, ...you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." and again, "...if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed". (John 8:32, 36). We have witnessed first hand the wonderful, joyful liberation experienced by those set free from guilt or shame through faith in Christ.

Lewis, author of the wonderful Narnia series of books, and very many others, as well as being a great philosopher and Christian apologist, stated that in his opinion all sin stems from pride. Pride, that sense of entitlement that may cause us to be angry when someone goes ahead of us in a queue, cuts us up on the road, or some other minor infringement of our personal space; or that causes us to feel that we are entitled to keep hidden some income, and so avoid paying tax; that we are entitled to look with possessive lust on another person. That's the pride that leads marriages to fail, families to break up, nations to go to war, and we are guilty of that.

We are so very grateful for the Cross of Christ which reminds us that Jesus has paid the price that enables us to be forgiven; and it's an empty cross, because He rose again after the crucifixion, and sends His Holy Spirit to guide us into truth, and help us in our weakness.

ALL lives matter to Him.

Mole - by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust ... and I live in a hole

If your lawn is full of nectar-rich flowers for butterflies and bees, with a patch of long grass for grasshoppers and hedgehogs, then Mother Nature will thank you, but if you're one of those particular people who demands that their lawn is a perfectly manicured carpet, slathered in chemicals and shamelessly shaved each summer Sunday, then Mother Nature will not be happy and she'll send in her best hit man. So while on 5th November we remember, remember Guy Fawkes, I'm here to celebrate Britain's other infamous tunnelling terrorist – the mole.

It's hard to bond with the mole. Like 99.9% of us, I've never seen one and probably never will. They're almost a supernatural entity – the Bigfoot of the back garden. Their invisibility means my mental image of the mole has been painted by *The Wind in the Willows* and children's cartoons instead of real-life encounters. I'm always surprised when I see an actual photo of one and it's not wearing glasses.

Moles aren't blind. Admittedly, they'll be struggling by the second line of an eye test but there isn't much call for perfect eyesight when you spend all your life in total darkness. Instead, their pink nose is covered with 5,000 sensory organs which register touch and vibration, allowing the mole to 'see' with its snout; a super-sense that makes them efficient hunters. Their tunnel network spreads out like an underground web and when a wiggling worm drops into it the mole's super-senses tingle, sending them scrambling through their pitch-black passageways. Worms are captured, cleaned, beheaded and stored, still wriggling, in a larder for future consumption.

The mole's front paws are like a pair of giant pink snow-shovels and come equipped with an extra thumb; a characteristic they share with the giant panda. These wide shovel-hands can move an incredible 540 times their own weight of soil in a day. That's like me moving 55.46 tonnes of mud (and before you go scrambling for your calculators, yes, I could do with losing a few pounds).

The molehills that erupt on our lawns are spoil heaps created by the construction work below. OK —they're unsightly but gardeners should be welcoming moles. When potted, molehill soil makes an excellent growing medium for seeds and seedlings, so if you're blessed with molehills - grab a trowel. Once the tunnels are completed the molehills will stop appearing and, in the long run, mole burrowing bestows untold benefits to soil aeration and quality, but for me, it's a pleasure just knowing that such an amazing animal is living, unseen, a few inches below my feet. Some people will still complain but I guess some folk will always make a mountain out of a, well ... y'know.



November garden notes

September was set to be completely devoid of rain until Storm Alex tracked across from the continent bringing much needed, though rather heavy, rain.... (100mm) in four days and unwelcome strong winds. It's been pretty wet since.

Some vulnerable trees fell (we lost a large Liquidamber which had some rot in the stem), leaves and plant debris was strewn along the sides of roads. However, the good news is the grass looks much healthier and the ground is now soft enough for planting bulbs and shrubs. November is always a variable month with either clear skies and frosts or murky, misty, damp weather.

In the vegetable garden, take down bean poles, burn bean haulms, especially if infected with rust, likewise bin any tomato plants with blight. Stake sprouts and other vulnerable brassicas; keep harvesting leeks, swede and parsnips. Cover brassicas with netting as pigeons will undoubtedly find your plants and peck away as winter arrives. Compost as much garden waste as you can like leaves and dead stems. Unwanted seed heads and perennials weeds are best burnt, if you are able to, without upsetting neighbours - or taken to the amenity tip.

As winter draws in, indoor plants can bring good cheer and a welcome splash of natural colour into our homes. Non hardy cyclamen will keep best if you remove dying and mouldy leaves and flowers to avoid botrytis infections. Indoor azaleas need plenty of water, but winter cactus little. Both prefer plenty of light but not the brilliant south facing window-sill sort. East or west facing or a position set back from a south facing window is best. Poinsettias like it warm with reasonable light. African violets are easy to look after and even the carnivorous plants, though they don't produce any colour in the flowering department.

If you save or overwinter tender plants like salvias, pelargoniums, nemesias and some fuchsias they need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into a greenhouse or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, some may survive if partially wrapped in bubble polythene. Waterlogged or frozen pots are bad news! For those who store vegetables and fruit, keep a check regularly for rotten/mouldy ones . As the biblical saying goes: "a little yeast works through a whole batch of dough. Get rid of the old yeast that you may be a new batch without yeast" (1 Corinthians 5 v 6) i.e. one bad one can infect a whole lot of good ones!
