NOVEMBER / DECEMBER 2021 Pastoral Letter St Mary's Slaugham and St Mark's Staplefield

Dear Friends,

Where can we find hope today?

If your household is anything like ours you may be finding it difficult to escape from talk of Covid-19. Our grandson tested positive for Covid-19 at the beginning of half term, and my sister and her husband (in Cornwall) have been quite unwell with the infection. These infections have had consequences for many of our family, sharply curtailing planned half term activities. Eagerly anticipated activities like football training and outings have had to be cancelled, and we have each had to limit contacts with other people, to avoid risk to others as far as possible.

But we have a very easy life compared to so many. With numbers of Covid-19 daily cases in the UK reaching new peaks and the total UK deaths now over 141,000, levels of fear are once again increasing.

This is against a background of what feels like bad news from all quarters. Violence against women, relationships with our allies soured by conflict over trade and fishing rights, rising living costs, threatened gas supplies, irreversible damage caused by global warming, among the many issues providing fuel for the increasing flames of fear.

Arguably, mankind are trustees for the care of this wonderful, beautiful planet which has been entrusted to us – and the evidence says that we are failing in our trusteeship.

As I write this, the "Conference of 26 Parties" (COP 26 Climate Conference) is convening in Glasgow. In his powerful opening speech Sir David Attenborough pleaded with world leaders to take action to limit rising global temperatures. "Our motivation", he said "should not be fear, but hope".

Ultimately, where can that hope come from?

Jen and I are very privileged to have been closely linked to Kagando, a rural district general hospital on the equator, under the mighty Rwenzori Mountains in Western Uganda, for the past 42 years. For 12 of those years we have lived there; our youngest son, Stephen, was born there. During this time we have watched the snow line on the mountain receding, the forests disappearing, and devastating flooding alternating with drought causing more and more hardship. Climate change is real, especially for the poor.

Of all the instructions and rules in the Bible (Do not kill, do not steal, do not lie, love your neighbour as yourself, and so on) the commonest instruction of all is this: DO NOT FEAR!

Another Ugandan friend gave us a gift, a simple piece of wood on which is written: "I am not afraid of tomorrow, because I know that God is already there". On what is that faith, that confidence in God based? Is it an illusion? Is that instruction "Do not fear!" empty and meaningless?

Victor Hugo wrote what many regard as the greatest novel ever written. Set in the context of the French Revolution, published in 1862, a story of injustice, vindictiveness, forgiveness, redemption, love and grace, it is the basis for the wonderful musical and film "Les Miserables". At the climax of the story the hero, Jean Valjean, surrounded by utter devastation and death on the Paris barricades, raises his arms to heaven, pleading for the life of his adopted daughter's fiancée, crying out "O God on high, hear my prayer..."

That was fiction. In reality, does God answer prayer? Is there a God on high? The Apostle Paul, in his letter to the Galatians, (chapter 2, verse 20), wrote this: "This life that I live now, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave his life for me". The Son of God, Jesus, demonstrated His love for us by dying a criminal's death on a Roman cross, and demonstrated His authority over death and all creation by rising to life again — an historical fact underpinned by a huge body of evidence. And so, yes, Sir David, real hope can indeed be our motivation, not fear. Hope in a God who is Sovereign, alive, loves us, calls us personally by name, inviting us to trust in Him and His good plans for us and all creation.

Turkey: Naked Christmas Lunch - Michael Blencowe

Post-modernist author William Burroughs named his infamous 1959 novel after "a frozen moment when everyone sees what is on the end of every fork." Like the drug-fuelled characters of *Naked Lunch*, 76% of Brits will soon be itching for their festive fix from a bird which has taken a strange, disjointed trip through time and space to land on our plates. So, before you start gobbling this Christmas, allow yourself a frozen moment with the defrosted, oven-cooked, gravy-coated bird perched on the end of your fork. Let's talk turkey.

There are just two species of turkey in the world. The stunning iridescent Ocellated Turkey is confined to the Yucatan peninsula, while the commoner Wild Turkey has a range that extends from the sun-baked savannahs of central Mexico north through the oak forests of the United States.

The Wild Turkey is a monstrous, spectacular bird. The huge males prowl the forests, their ruffled black feathers billowing like a cloud of volcanic ash. From this darkness erupts a bare, blue reptilian head with lava flows of red, warty skin dripping from it. These grotesque, leathery skin-flaps — the snood, wattle and caruncle — inflate with blood and are irresistible to females.

This extraordinary animal was revered by primitive people who plucked its feathers for ceremonial rituals. Centuries ago, one population of Wild Turkey from the hills of south-central Mexico was tamed. By the time the Aztecs ruled the roost they wore turkey, ate turkey and prayed to Chalchiuhtotolin, their turkey god.

Spaniards returned from their Aztec conquests with ships laden with gold, silver and turkey. Not long after, in 1524, turkeys landed in England where some geographic confusion about their country of origin gave the bird its name. Soon these supposed Turkish delights were being carved and served to the wealthy. Henry VIII may well have been one of the first Brits to enjoy a turkey for Christmas lunch and then no doubt spent the rest of the afternoon asleep in front of the jester.

The turkey's domestication continued. In eastern England, specialist poulterers developed breeds such as Norfolk Black, Cambridge Bronze and the Broad Breasted White; the bird that we eat today.

In 1620 the Pilgrim settlers, in a 'coals to Newcastle' scenario, shipped these brainwashed breeds back to North America and proudly gave them to the bemused native people who for centuries had been enjoying the rich, dark meat of the larger, original Wild Turkeys. It must have been like aliens landing outside Harvey's Brewery and presenting us with a small glass of weak lager.

Today we remain a nation of turkey addicts. Ten million of them were eaten here last Christmas. It's time to stop staring at your fork and satisfy your Christmas craving – so get it while it's hot. It'll be cold turkey for us from tomorrow. Merry Christmas everybody and best wishes for 2022.

Fairy Shrimp: just add water - Michael Blencowe

I'm still disappointed. As a child, I read American Spiderman comics but I was always captivated by the inside back cover. There, an advert for 'sea-monkeys' showed a family of bizarre, grinning humanoid creatures which would become your pets and "bring smiles, laughter and fun into your home" if you sent away a fistful of dollars to somewhere called 'New Jersey'. Living in Olde England, the offer didn't apply and my childhood therefore remained devoid of "smiles, laughter and fun." I realise now that an even greater disappointment awaited if I had actually ordered these creatures. In reality, sea-monkeys were simply brine shrimps: tiny crustaceans, not incredible aquatic simians.

Just like sea-monkeys, Britain's Fairy Shrimp are also crustaceans from the order Anostraca. They have transparent bodies, antennae, blobby black eyes on stalks and twenty-two leaf-like legs which propel them, upside down, through water. They're positively prehistoric-looking and haven't bothered to evolve much since the Triassic period 200 million years ago. It's amazing they have survived so long. Unlike other crustaceans, such as crabs and woodlice, Fairy Shrimp do not have hard exoskeletons. This armour-free existence leaves them vulnerable and they can only survive where nothing will eat them, but where on earth can you find such a habitat on our hostile planet? Safe, predator-free homes don't just fall out of the sky.

As rain falls, it transforms the ruts, ditches and depressions of our world into puddles and these puddles are a freshwater fresh start for life. The Fairy Shrimp are the first settlers in this safe new world, but how do they get there? The spooky truth is they have always been there. Like Spiderman, the Fairy Shrimp have their own superpowers. Their eggs can lie desiccated and dormant in the soil for years, even decades. They are resurrected by water; the Pot Noodles of the animal world. There are legends of 100-year-old Anostraca eggs taken from museum shelves, wetted and awakened. One tale even tells of eggs carbon-dated at 10,000 years old being resurrected.

It's a long, dry wait down there in the earth but, when rain arrives, the pool party starts. Newly formed puddles teem with Fairy Shrimp but puddles are only temporary accommodation. To adapt, Fairy Shrimp have a fast life cycle; a race to produce more eggs before their home dries and disappears. Unsurprisingly, Fairy Shrimp are incredibly rare and hard to find and you're more likely to encounter some actual fairies. If you're out hiking on the South Downs looking to make a new start in 2022, keep checking those puddles. You may find some other animals trying to make a new start too.



HANDCROSS W.I. 1918 - 2016

In December 2016 it was decided to suspend the above W.I. which was a disappointment to the members, as we had not reached our 100th birthday. The records had been given to me by Mr.Barry Ray who had put all the details of Handcross W.I. of the last 98 years on the Slaugham, Handcross, Pease Pottage, Warninglid and Staplefield archive website. There were some record books missing but there is plenty of information on line.

Memories of some of the W.I. projects that members were involved in are contained in the records. The money for these various projects was raised by having events in the parish hall with the support of members and residents of the villages. The main projects to mark various birthdays of the W.I. are:

- 1) The village sign that is near the entrance to Cow Wood footpath which was to celebrate the 60th birthday. I cannot remember who designed it, but a local blacksmith made it.
- 2) The illuminated sign over the entrance to the parish hall was given to the committee for our 65th birthday, and which has been a great help on dark nights.
- 3) The third project was to celebrate our 75th birthday. It is the wall hanging in the parish hall which members worked on for about 5 years. The designers of the hanging was Mrs Pat Long and Mrs Janet Masters. Janet went around the parish villages taking photographs of buildings and interesting items so that members could design and work on them. The wall at the bottom of the hanging contains all the names of members in the W.I. at the time. The frame for the hanging was made by Mr Avery in Crawley. The hanging was unveiled by brother and sister Mr Michael Warren and Mrs Mary Habershon at our celebration meal in the hall in January 1993 with invited guests and members. It was a very enjoyable evening.
- 4) The last project we worked on was a table-cloth for the year 2000 which represented different activities that we had taken part in. This is now in the Heritage Room at North Lodge for safe keeping.

I thought that there might be former members of the W.I. and possibly their families who would be interested in reading and knowing about the various activities, and also where old records are kept and can be found.
