### REMEMBER

November is always a month in which we remember. Whether it is using a rhyme to help our children remember a date on which fireworks displays take place, or gathering around a cenotaph to remember those who gave their lives and who still risk their lives through war. Remembering our history is a good and important thing to do but I wonder if this November we need to have an extra level of remembering – remembering those who may be forgotten by others.

We live in a very self-driven culture. We want to ensure life is comfortable and convenient for us, and that is very understandable. Some may worry about how the cost-of-living crisis will affect them and their comforts. We may worry about what we can afford, what we may have to do without, how we will heat our homes and so much more. What we can forget when doing this is that there are people for whom this is not a new concern. People who have been living in poverty or fear of poverty for some while, both internationally and locally.

I was listening recently to an interview with a lady who leads an outreach to Syrian refuges in Lebanon. Churches are working together to help people in need despite their hatred of each other in the past, but she said something that really struck me: 'Lebanon isn't in the news anymore, but the needs are greater than they have ever been.' It can be so easy to forget things that aren't in front of us at the time.

Even locally, we can easily forget or not even know about the need that is around us. Sometimes because that need is hidden, sometimes because we choose not to see it, and sometimes because we are too distracted by our own lives and issues to notice – but the needs are there.

The Handcross Community Pantry was founded in 2019 because we became very aware of some of those needs. But the heart of the Pantry is so much more than giving food to people who need it. At its very heart, the Pantry is about building relationships with those who feel alone in their struggle, it is about growing together and learning from each other, it is about supporting each other and blessing each other. Some come to give, some to receive, some just to have a chat and a coffee, but the aim is not about creating dependency, but community – because we all need community.

As I type this, Radio 2 has just premiered a new track by Queen featuring some rediscovered vocals by Freddie Mercury. The message of the song is that when it comes down to the hard things in life, the only option is to face them alone. Thankfully these lyrics simply are not true. No one should ever feel that they have to face any struggles alone. Many people may feel as though they do. Maybe they feel as if no can help them, or would want to help them. Maybe they feel too proud or ashamed to ask for help. Maybe they are worried of what might happen if they admit they need help. But whatever the reason, we need to make sure we are doing all we can for them to know that they are not forgotten.

Jesus made it very clear that this is something that is at the heart of who God is. Our God is a lover of justice, who cares for the poor and vulnerable and desires that we do the same. In Matthew's gospel, He gives examples of how we can best serve Him and honour Him, and it isn't by gathering in a church to sing (although that is honouring to Him) but it is by remembering, loving and serving those who are most forgotten by the world – even if they are our enemies.

So if you are in a position to be able to think of others and you have a desire to help, then why not speak to us about the work of the Handcross Community Pantry and ask us how you could get involved in something that seeks to make sure that no one is forgotten and that no one has to suffer alone. And if you are reading this and you need help, then I urge you to be as brave as you can and to come along one Saturday where you will be welcomed without judgement by people who want to and can help. (Despite its name, the Handcross Community Pantry is available for anyone who lives within our parishes, which is residents of Slaugham, Warninglid, Staplefield, Pease Pottage and Handcross.)

Regardless of what Freddie Mercury may have thought – you do not have to face this difficult winter alone!
