## **HOPE**

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

As we start a new year, Jen and I are struck again by the changes which we have experienced over our 72 years. Apart from obvious things like technological advances (personal computers, mobile phones and digital time-keeping devices were unheard of throughout our school days) there are less obvious changes – like the effects of climate change.

But the changes in our lifetime are insignificant compared with the huge changes in our world over the period of recorded history.

But one thing is absolutely not changing. Human suffering is as grotesque and universal today as it has been since the earliest days of recorded history. In AD 155, Polycarp, aged 86 years, Bishop of Smyrna (modern day Izmir, Turkey) refused to deny Jesus Christ and was burnt to death. In Oxford, England, Bishops Latimer and Ridley were burnt at the stake in 1555.

Today we have the terrible brutal war in Ukraine; unspeakable atrocities committed daily; images of poorly equipped Russian soldiers dying of cold; bereaved Ukrainian mothers and families mourning their loved ones; in other countries, children dying of starvation. I have witnessed appalling suffering in Uganda. Here in 'comfortable' Sussex, a young woman weeps uncontrollably over being abandoned with her young children by her unfaithful husband; a middle aged man struggles with painful terminal cancer.

Suffering is real, immediate, compelling, inescapable and savage.

Different cultures approach suffering in very different ways. A secular view expressed by Richard Dawkins says that there is "no purpose, no evil, no good, nothing but pitiless indifference".

What's the Christian approach?

**First**, the Bible promises an end to all suffering. The writer of the book of Revelation (chapter 21) wrote:

Verse 1 Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth. Verse 3 I heard a loud voice speaking from the throne: "Now God's home is with people! He will live with them, and they shall be His people. God Himself will be with them, and He will be their God." Verse 4 He (Himself!) will wipe away all tears from their eyes. There will be no more death, no more grief or crying or pain. Verse 5 Then the one who sits on the throne said, ... "Write this, because these words are true and can be trusted."

**Second**, God Himself experienced overwhelming suffering. Jesus, from His birth in poverty, His life as a refugee, His rejection by the religious leaders of His day, through to His death on a Roman cross, identified totally with all who suffer – "God was reconciling the world to Himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them... and God made Him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God" *(2 Corinthians 5:19,21)*.

There is sound, historical evidence for the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. This is true, and can be trusted. And He will come again and put an end to all suffering.
