#### **THIRST**

Dear Friends,

Have you ever been *really* thirsty? We all know what it means to feel thirsty, but not many know what severe, life-threatening thirst feels like.

UN statistics show that around two-thirds of the world's population experience severe water shortage for at least one month in a year. 2.2 billion people have no regular access to safe drinking water, 4.2 billion people have no safe sanitation, and 3 billion have no basic handwashing facility.

60% of the human body on average is made up of water (ranging from 22% in our bones, to about 85% in our livers), so water is physically vital to us!

There are thousands of people around the world who are, as you read this, feeling desperately thirsty.

I have experienced quite severe thirst. In 1992 I was a member of a team carrying out cataract surgery in a remote place called Bundibugyo, just inside Uganda on the border with Democratic Republic of Congo, at the northern end of the majestic Rwenzori Mountains ('Mountains of the Moon'). At that time, the road to get there was very rough, dusty and slow, and when it came to the time to travel back to a town called Fort Portal (about eight hours by road then) I decided to walk over the northern end of the mountain, going up to about 11,000 feet above sea level, instead of going in a minibus with the team on the long road round.

I made the mistake of not taking water with me, thinking I could always drink from streams along the way; this was OK until I discovered, as I descended on the East side, that the streams were heavily polluted by habitations above me. Water-borne disease was (and still is) very prevalent, so I struggled on until I got down to where there was a small mud walled 'duka' (shop), and to my enormous relief (I was desperately thirsty!) was able to buy bottles of Pepsi-Cola!

I have had the great privilege of being part of teams supporting CHASE (a children's hospice) running the London (x10) and Brighton (x1) marathons. On warm sunny days, in spite of frequent water stations, quite severe thirst was part of the experience!

BUT on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2023 Mina Guli completed her <u>200<sup>th</sup> Marathon</u> in one year. She did this to draw attention to the world's desperate need for safe water. What an achievement!

There are many references in the Bible to man's universal need for water. The strategic importance of good wells, invitations to drink, and God's invitation to 'all who are thirsty' to come and drink freely are all referred to.

The Bible's references to water and thirst refer to far more than just our physical need for water. Look at some of the references:

**Isaiah Chapter 55, verse 1** "Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy ... without money and without cost."

In **John's gospel chapter 4, verses 13-14** Jesus was speaking to a woman whom He met as she came to draw water from a well, and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

Then again in **John Chapter 6, verse 35**: "I am the Bread of Life", Jesus told them. "those who come to Me ... who believe in Me will never be thirsty."

Finally, right at the end of the Bible, just four verses from the end of the last chapter of the last book (**Revelation Chapter 22, verse 17**), we read: "The Spirit and the bride say, 'Come!' And let the one who hears say, 'Come!' Let the one who is thirsty come; and let the one who wishes take the free gift of the water of life."

In these contexts, what is the meaning of the 'thirst', and the "free gift of the water of life"?

It is clear that the thirst is our universal human need for forgiveness, and the free gift of water is the unconditional free gift of forgiveness paid for by Jesus when He died on the cross that first Good Friday. "God so loved the world that he gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." (John Chapter 3, verse 16)

I'm thirsty for that.
