So here we are in August - high summer. Apparently, to the author Henry James, 'summer afternoon' was the most beautiful combination of words in the English language. (He was, mind you, born in North America, so perhaps his experience of summer was slightly more reliable than our British one.)

I tend to agree with him. I so enjoy the warmth in the air and the abundance of colour and fragrance in our gardens. I'm always enchanted by the green tunnels that get created in our Sussex lanes - something I've not seen quite this way in any other county. It feels that the moment I step outside, there are sights at every turn to appreciate - even on my humdrum walk to the supermarket. I pass under bushes that hang over the pavement from the railway embankment and a gorgeous scent makes me look around and find honeysuckle above me. I breathe it in deeply and can't help but say thank you.

A writer that I like says this:

"Earth is so thick with divine possibility that it's a wonder we can walk anywhere without cracking our shins on altars." (Barbara Brown Taylor - An Altar in the World)

An altar in a church is a place where we often kneel - in prayer, in worship. From Adam to Moses, altars were usually built upon the tops of mountains, often at a place where God had somehow made himself known to people. So I love the idea that altars are all around us and God is always at the ready to show something of himself to us.

It seems to me that August is an extra good time to find yourself called to pause and find God in a moment of beauty on a lazy summer afternoon - to recognise how God loves to give himself to us in so many ways and in so many places of our lives. To stumble into an altar.

I've recently been listing my altars - here are a few of them:

- the array of wild flowers in the scrubby patch of grass (not grass) at the back of our flats
- the huge smile of a friend who was glad to see me again after three years
- a hug I received at church
- a handwritten letter that came in the post
- a huge prehistoric-looking stork that filled the sky in a walk at Knepp recently
- and roses! Aren't they stunning right now?

Doesn't it do us good to be taken out of ourselves in moments of wonder, even if fleetingly? Good for our mental health, good for our physical wellbeing and certainly good for our emotional and spiritual lives.

So I'm just off to bang my shins on a few more altars - you're welcome to join me!
