Church

I love church!

I wonder when the last time was that you heard someone say that? If ever?

But for me, it is true. I do love church.

I know that the church is not perfect, far from it, and I know there is no such thing as a perfect church. There is a famous saying that goes 'if you think you have found the perfect church then you have already ruined it by walking in'. What that means is that as soon as people are involved, church ceases to be perfect, but that doesn't mean it can't be good.

I am very aware that the perception of church for many people is far from positive. Our history lessons show a difficult past, the media makes us very aware of the division and cover up, and even hurt, caused by 'the church' over many years, but none of this means that the church can't be and isn't good.

At its best, the church can be, and should be, a good place to be, doing good things for its surrounding communities. When it is authentic, church is full of people who have a genuine love for God, who are seeking to grow in their understanding of their faith, and to live together well.

In the Bible, the church is described using a number of different analogies. It is described as a flock, a body of many parts, a community, a temple, a family, the bride of Christ, and a gathering of people. Each of these only go part of the way to describe what was ultimately given to us as a gift from Jesus — a place where people can get to know Him better, with others who are seeking to do the same.

But the reality is that's not always what we see. I recently saw a letter from another church leader which was essentially telling people off for not attending church, and this upset me hugely because it seemed to somewhat miss the point. The biggest

challenge for the church is that when one or more churches do things in a way that is not good, the church as a whole can be tarnished with that same brush; but I believe that there are churches that are still doing good and that are good at their core — ordinary places of worship, with people who are genuine and kind (although not perfect). One of the most surprising discoveries for me as a teenager was that not all churches are the same. I had assumed when I found my local church to be boring, that all churches were going to be like that — it took me a long time to discover that this wasn't the case.

There can be so many things that prevent us from attending our local church – here are just a few of the reasons I have come across (and some that even kept me away when I was younger).

It will be boring and stuffy

I'll be honest here: I have definitely been to services that are boring, but what is boring for people is a matter of opinion. But one thing I can say for sure is that Tuesday morning services at St Mark's are far from boring! Ask any of the children from the school and I hope they would agree – and these services are open to anyone.

I don't believe in God

Church thankfully isn't just for those who believe in God. The church and the services are open to anyone. Whether you want to find out more, ask questions, or even just meet other people, then you are welcome.

I won't be welcome ("the church would burn down if I walked in")

I am thankful every day that we don't have to be perfect to go to church — otherwise all our churches would be very empty. Anyone is welcome, regardless of your background, what you have or haven't done in your life. I hope very much that you would be welcomed by all.

They only want me for my money

Whilst it is true that the church is a charity, and like all charities it needs support, this isn't the motive for invitation to church. It is our express desire that we as a church are here for the community, and not just the other way around. So, while donations are appreciated, they are not an expectation (despite what you may have heard from other churches).

They will bash me with a Bible

Obviously, in a church service the Bible will be used – but not for any bashing!

All this is to say that we want you to know that the churches of St Mary's, St Mark's and All Saints are here for you. If you need a quiet space to pray during the week, St Mary's and St Mark's are open. If you need a place to be your true self, a place where you can find community, then you are welcome to join us for authentic worship, or even if you want a place that you can have fun on a Tuesday morning — we are here for you and we would love to see you. I can't promise that what you be find will be perfect — but I hope, trust and pray it will be good!
