It all comes down to love

It was Wednesday 27th December 2023 and I was in a supermarket to pick up a few essentials, and it had already happened. The seasonal aisle was no longer full of Christmas decorations and chocolate. In place of all the golds, greens and reds was a wall of pink...Christmas is over, Valentine's day is coming (a little further up the aisle were Easter eggs but let's not go into that!).

St Valentine is commemorated on 14th February each year, and long before the advent of cards and roses being sent to loved ones, the day was used to remember the care and dedication that Valentine showed to persecuted Christians in ancient Rome. Due to its fast growth, Christianity was considered at the time to be a huge threat to the Roman empire, and so many people claiming to be followers of Jesus were persecuted for their new-found faith. Often having to worship in secret and use codes and hidden symbols to talk about Jesus, many in the early church would have felt fearful, lost and at times alone. Their faith and commitment to Jesus was unwavering and they would do all they could to share the good news that they themselves had received – that Jesus was alive!

Saint Valentine was a clergyman (thought to have either been a priest or a bishop) who had a particular calling to support those who were facing persecution. As is the case with many of the Saints we remember today, Valentine's story has been embellished over the years and it is hard to separate fact from fiction, but one of the stories that has led to him being remembered in connection to love is that he is rumoured to have conducted secret weddings for Christian couples – something that would have been a huge risk for him personally.

Regardless of how we remember him, and regardless of which part of his story is true, the stories show something of the love of God, because any love that we show to others or that others show to us is a reflection of God's love. We are all made in the image of the God who is love. And as the writer of the letter of John says so beautifully: 'let us love one another, for love is from God...we love because he first loved us.'

You were made because of His love, and in His image, you have the ability to love others. And it matters what we turn the attention of our love to. God's ultimate desire is for the love that He has shown you to be shown back to Him – this is why we have that as a choice rather than a command – but it's also His heart's desire that we seek to love others well. Our love won't always be pure or perfect, but God's love always will be, and His perfect love is the only power great enough in this world to cast out all fear.

So, may you know His love for you today and may you share that love to those around you.
